From the Rector

I am writing this in early May, and the buzz from our April celebrations haven't yet died down completely. On Sunday, April 16, we celebrated Easter. The following Sunday, we welcomed Bishop Mauricio and Sandra Andrade from the Diocese of Brasilia to St. John's. Less than a week after that, Saturday, April 29, we celebrated the consecration of Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows as the 11th Bishop of Indianapolis. Easter is always glorious, and this year was no exception. Thanks to everyone who helped ready the church for Holy Week and Easter Sunday (Hilary and Bob, Michael, Teresa, Eva Duran, the Altar Guild, Sue Bracey and the rest of the folks who provided and arranged flowers, the Garden Committee, the acolytes and other ministers, everyone who brought treats, and especially everyone who helped make cross cookies). Thanks also to everyone who helped make Bishop Mauricio and Sandra's visit special. Thanks to everyone who helped with setup and clean-up. Thanks especially to Ross Watson for another wonderful mess of BBQ. In case you didn't know, he spent about 18 hours smoking that delicious pulled pork. Bishop Mauricio and Sandra were very grateful for your hospitality. During the reception after Bishop Jennifer's consecration, Mauricio grabbed me out of the crowd, hugged me and thanked me profusely. Oh and by the way, we were able to send \$1,000 to his discretionary fund. So, thank you all for your generosity.

I wanted to reflect on Bishop Jennifer's consecration for a moment. The service was nothing short of amazing. Clowes Hall was packed — there must have been nearly 2,000 people there. The service included four or five processions, dozens of acolytes, 180 people in the choir, an additional Spanish-language choir from Christ Church Cathedral, church banners from nearly every church in the diocese, more than 40 Bishops from around the Anglican Communion, and all sorts of other church dignitaries. Michael Curry, the Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, was the chief consecrator. The Bishop of the Kentucky and Indiana Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and the new Bishop of Northern Indiana were both co-consecrators. Barbara Harris, retired Bishop Suffragan from Massachusetts and the first woman elected a bishop in the Anglican Communion, was there as well. When she processed in, a large group of clergy stood up, shouted and waved. Yes, there are celebrities in the church.

The service had a little something for everyone (it was nearly three hours long after all). There were all the trappings of a beautiful, high church service — acolytes, processions, incense and the like. There were all the formalities of a consecration — the reading of certifications and pension fund details and a lengthy offering of gifts to the new Bishop. But there was an excitement and energy — cat calls, spontaneous applause, etc. — that don't usually show up in solemn worship. There was an incredible sermon from Jeffrey Lee, the Bishop of Chicago. And there was *so much* bread and wine — enough bread I am sure to feed 10,000 people. There were several different musical styles (including large choral arrangements, spirituals and even Mariachi). It really was spectacular. The service was like a pep rally for the Episcopal Church. It would have been hard to leave that service without feeling energized and encouraged about the Church's future.

Moments of celebration in the church's life — moments like Easter Sunday, like Bishop Mauricio's visit or Bishop Jennifer's consecration — are like pep rallies for our life of faith. By the time you read this, we will be coming to the end of Easter season and preparing for "Ordinary Time." This is the long growing season of the Church's life that stretches from the dog days of summer into the late fall. After all the celebrations, Ordinary Time is the season we roll up our sleeves and get to work — the work of feeding the hungry, the work of seeking out the lost, the work of sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ in a world that so desperately needs to hear it. 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A Few Book Recommendations

Rowan Williams, *Tokens of Trust* (Westminster John Knox Press, 2007)

This book is now 10 years old, but I just heard about it a few months back. It is an introduction to Christian belief through the lens of the Christian creeds, but it walks through those creeds in a novel and, I think, very helpful way. The driving question of the book is, "Why should I trust God?" Williams, who is the former Archbishop of Canterbury and one of the most profound living theologians, writes in a beautiful and compelling way about the effect that Christian belief — Christian trust — can have on our lives and on the world. He takes complicated questions — questions about the nature of God, the nature of the Trinity, the relationship between the Creator God and Jesus, the grounds for Christian ethics, and more — and makes them seem like relevant, even interesting, questions. It's also mercifully short.

Michael Eric Dyson, Tears We Cannot Stop: A Sermon to White America (St. Martin's Press, 2017)

Dyson is a well-known public intellectual, ordained minister and sociologist at Georgetown University. This short book is a sermon, a sermon that both exposes and convicts. Dyson offers white America a searing evaluation of how whiteness is experienced by black Americans and how it continues to destroy individuals and communities. Without doubt, there's a lot of pain in this book—the pain of Dyson's own experience and the experience of African-Americans. But there's also the pain of being shown so clearly, so brutally, so effectively just how much damage has been done in the name of white supremacy, and the recognition that I have been a part of that. The book, it turns out, is not a feel-good story, but it is an important opportunity for white Americans to hear a powerful voice calling us to reconciliation and justice. (By the way, I would recommend the audible version of the book, since Dyson's passion, anger, sadness, and sincerity come through most clearly in his own voice.)
