# **Capital Campaign Update**

On the morning we write this article, the St. John's community is at the end of its period of Lenten reflection and is on the brink of celebrating the glories of Holy Week. In the midst of the spiritual significance the season brings us, the St. John's Capital Campaign has been busy at work behind the scenes distilling the information it received during the feedback sessions it conducted earlier in the winter, consulting with our general contractor to better understand cost estimates and working with the fundraising consultant provided by the Diocese to fine-tune our Case Statement.

The next step members of the St. John's community will experience as the campaign progresses is a parishwide survey responding to the Case Statement. We anticipate the survey will be administered in May and are using these final weeks of April to make sure we have accurate contact information for our parishioners. The survey will be administered electronically via email. ## From the Rector

Many of you know that for several years, I would have identified myself as an atheist. My "spiritual journey" back to the Church had many twists and turns. But I was influenced in no small part by a class I took my senior year of college. In the class — a general studies class called "Christ in the Modern Novel" — we read several novels and watched several movies that illuminated the story of Jesus in all sorts of contexts. I still remember several of the books and movies well — D. H. Lawrence's the Man Who Died, Jack Schaefer's Shane, the film Jesus of Montreal, and more. I was not a particularly good student, but I read every book for that class (okay, confession, I never finished Graham Greene's the Power and the Glory). For the first time in my life, something about the Christian faith seemed intellectually viable, even compelling. For me, it was a first step.

The best book by far was Shūsaku Endō's book *Silence*. The novel tells the story of Portuguese missionaries in Japan during a period when Christianity was illegal there. It is a powerful, powerful reflection on the depths of Christ's sacrifice and the relationship between God's silence and our action. The movie was recently made into a film by Martin Scorsese.

I recently reread the book for the first time, since that class. I thought about it, and realized that it was exactly 20 years to the week that I had read the book and gave a presentation in that class. I even wrote my professor and thanked him for the class, which had such a profound effect on me. As I said to the professor in my note, I don't think I understand Endō's book any better now than I did 20 years ago (although as a priest, I think I buy it with more fear and trembling than before). Nonetheless, I commend this book to you as yet another entry point into the depths of God's love for us and our calling to serve.

I do not believe that God has given us this trial to not purpose. I know that the day will come when we will clearly understand why this persecution with all its sufferings has been bestowed upon us—for everything that Our Lord does is for our good. And yet, even as I write these words I feel the oppressive weight in my heart of those last stammering words of Kichijiro in the morning of his departure: 'Why has *Deus Sama* imposed this suffering on us?' and then the resentment in those eyes that he turned upon me. 'Father', he had said 'what evil have we done?'

I suppose I should simply cast from my mind these meaningless words of the coward; yet why does his plaintive voice pierce my breast with tall the pain of a sharp needle? Why has Our Lord imposed this torture and this persecution on poor Japanese peasants? No, Kichijiro was trying to express something different, something even more sickening. The silence of God. Already twenty years have passed since the persecution broke out; the black soil of Japan has been filled with the lament of so many Christians; the red blood of priests has flowed profusely; the walls of churches have fallen down; and in the face of this terrible and merciless sacrifice offered up to Him, God has remained silent.

#### Worship in the Street: Sunday, July 2



# From the Vestry: Meeting Summary, March 2017

- Charlie Shook presented information to the vestry regarding the installation of a hearing loop in the church to allow those with hearing aids to automatically be able to "tune" into the sound system. Installation of such a system would occur before the new flooring is added to the nave since it is installed in the floor.
- The vestry approved the feasibility study contract.
- Bradley spoke regarding the issue with finding volunteers for the Food Pantry. He indicated that our pantry serves nearly as many people as the Food Finders pantry, but they have several full-time staff members. He shared that the current food pantry model St. John's is using may not be sustainable.
- The vestry approved the recommendation for Alissa Goudswaard Anderson to the Priesthood.
- Amy Van Epps reported that Habitat for Humanity has asked St. John's to be part of the next Apostle's build, which requires a \$3,000 commitment. This amount is due by Aug. 1, with the build beginning on Sept 1. The Cover Indiana bike ride, which helps raise funds for Habitat, is May 7-13 this year.
- The Parish work day will be April 8.
- Bradley reported that Bishop Waynick will be at St. John's on April 2. The diocesan transition committee is raising money for a gift for the Bishop.
- The ordination of Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows will be held at Clowes Hall, Butler University, on April 29 at 11 a.m. Bradley encouraged everyone to attend, but you must RSVP.
- Bishop Mauricio will be attending St. John's on April 23. There will be a single service at 10:15 a.m. Ross Watson and Bradley are planning on cooking 100 lbs. of pulled pork for lunch after the service.
- The vestry approved a motion to pay for roof repair from Sullivan and Fortner, and to Coverite to fix the Sixth Street entrance awning, which was damaged by wind.
