Message from the Rector

The mission of the Church is the reconciliation of all people with God and one another in Christ. That's straight out of our catechism. Reconciliation is a return to a kind of fundamental unity. The Church — both the larger Church as the body of Christ in the world and the local church as the Body of Christ here, in this place and time — is supposed to model that unity, to be the sign of that unity. That unity does not exist in the world. And I think most of us also know that unity does not *really* exist in the Church, globally or locally. It's a mystery at best and a pipe dream at worst.

But to be fair, that's jumping the gun isn't it? What do we even mean by unity? Do we mean that everyone has to believe the same things? Do we have to agree on everything? I think part of the reason that there are so many Christian denominations is that we can't agree. So, we purify ourselves, create our own Christian splinter groups, and make sure we're all on the same page. After all, it's a fair question, right? If we don't all agree — about theology, about the Bible, about God, about the other big questions of life — at least a little, how can we be a community?

In the Episcopal Church, we have usually taken a different approach — a functional approach. “We don't care what you believe, just do things this way.” This ethos was borne out of the Reformation in England. Queen Elizabeth wanted uniformity of practice and obedience rather than uniformity of belief. She had “no desire to make windows into men's souls,” she was reported to have said. This means we sit in church with people we wholly disagree with even about deep, important, fundamental things. Unfortunately, even this functional approach only works for so long. Over time, the cracks start to show and even that more limited uniformity breaks down. As Rowan Williams describes it in his book *Where God Happens*, “We meet for events. We discharge our obligations. We sign up and do our duties. *But we miss the vital and living element of unity*” (Williams 113, my *emphasis*). We miss, the vital element that makes for true community and shared life.

Williams offers a different way of thinking about the church's unity. “I believe,” he says, “it is a unity that fundamentally exists in the shared gaze toward Christ, and through Christ to the Father.” He goes on to say:

If we believe that our unity comes from that looking together into a mystery and occasionally nudging one another and saying, ‘Look at that!’ it can help us to feel how the unity we enjoy is not primarily about ... uniformity [of belief or] saying the same words all the time.... But we must be willing to nudge one another and describe what we are seeing — whether in or out of the parish. (112-13)

In other words, it isn't about belief or practice, it's about a shared relationship, it's about a shared search for that relationship. To my mind, this makes a huge difference.

For my own part, I don't usually get complaints about theological issues (is that a sign that we've already self-selected or is everyone just being nice?), but I know from loads of conversations that we don't all share a unity of belief. And while most of the folks at St. John's at least like traditional worship (again, is that a sign of self-selection?), there's even disagreement about that. What we do share — or what we need to share in order to maintain a real sense of community — is the search for a relationship with Jesus and, through Jesus, with God. We're all looking for the same thing. We're all looking for meaning and love and forgiveness and acceptance. If we are really seeking, if we are really open to those things — if we are open to mystery ourselves and willing to share our experience of that mystery, of God, with others around us — then we can have different beliefs and experiences without losing our sense of unity and community. In fact, I think this will give rise to more humility and grace — this is what I see, tell me what you're seeing — as well as a deeper excitement and joy in our life together.

I hope you are having/have had a glorious Christmas season. I hope that you have seen God happen in your own life and in the life of your community. May we continue to seek Jesus and may we share the love of God with one another. —

First, I want to thank everyone who has served on the St. John's Vestry member over the past several years. The Vestry began discussing the outline of a capital campaign some three years ago. Tim Smith and Jim Marciniak have been on the Vestry almost that entire time. I also want to thank the members of the various task forces that began work in 2015 to outline projects; meet with designers, organ builders, and community leaders; and to create plans for this campaign.

I want to thank the members of the original steering committee: **Randy Brist, Maggie McClure, Heather Johnston Nicholson, Doug Powell, Catherine Fraser Riehle, Charlie Shook, Cynthia Stauffacher and Ross Watson.**

Now that we have come to the end of the campaign, I want to thank all the people who have worked so hard over the past few months to get us here:

- Our consultant, **Linda Buskirk**, was a great help, giving us counsel, helping us with logistics and more.
- **The Center for Congregations** and **the Diocese of Indianapolis** gave St. John's grants totaling \$22,500 that helped us pay our consulting fees.
- Here at St. John's, our parish administrator, **Teresa Lohrman**, made sure everything ran smoothly behind the scenes, and **Emily Umulis** provided great administrative support as well.
- In addition to his work on the steering committee and as Senior Warden, **Randy Brist** helped with communications for the campaign.
- **Hilary Cooke** served as the spiritual emphasis chair, writing our prayers and keeping us focused and grounded in God and our mission.
- **Jim Bodemiller** was the Planned Giving Shepherd.
- **Kristine Holtvedt** and **George Moore** worked together to plan our kick-off event in October.
- **Cynthia Stauffacher** has been the liaison between the capital campaign and our annual giving campaign.
- **Heather Johnston Nicholson** has been the campaign cat-herder — or Gift Ambassador coordinator. She has done an incredible job keeping track of visits and making sure everyone at St. John's has had a chance to participate in this campaign.

If you didn't know, this is the second time Charlie has served as the chair of a capital campaign here at St. John's. And he is two for two on coming out well ahead of the campaign goal.

Many thanks to each and every one of our **gift ambassadors**. Thank you for stepping out of your comfort zones and doing this important work. Thank you for your time and energy. Most of all, thank you for your willingness to serve when called upon. We clearly could not have done it without you.

And finally, thanks to all of you for your commitment to and care for this church community and our mission. God has richly blessed us, and you have responded to those blessings with grace and generosity. Thank you so very much.

So what's next? Well, you know that some of the work has already begun. The organ is gone and Quimby Organ Company in Warrensburg, Mo., is busy building the new one. The bulk of the work in the church will begin in January. And the Vestry will continue discerning how we will use additional gifts pledged to the campaign once we know the final costs of the projects already planned.

But as I've said a few times now, this campaign has been about more than a new organ or restoration work. It's really been about glorifying God in all that we do and about renewing our commitment to the mission and ministry whereby we glorify God. St. John's is a worshiping community called by Christ to grow spiritually and to nurture that growth in others, to strive for justice and peace among all people and to respect the dignity of every human being, to share God's love and our lives by reaching out to our community, and to make Christ known through word and action. The questions that are always before us as a church are these: **How can we live out this mission and ministry more fully and more effectively here in Lafayette and this time in our history? How can we grow in the knowledge and love of God, and how can we nurture that growth in others? Where in our community — and perhaps beyond it — are we called to seek justice and peace and foster reconciliation? Where can we share God's love — where is it most needed — and where can we share our lives by reaching out in our community and beyond? How can we share the good news of Jesus Christ, of the redeeming love of God, and of God's reconciling work in the world?**

The Vestry — including the new members of the Vestry — have already been talking about our work for next year. We are going to invite members of the congregation into a time of prayer and discernment around these questions. Please stay tuned, keep St. John's in your prayers, and bring the same commitment and care, grace and generosity to on-going work as you have to this capital campaign. — *Bradley Pace, bradleypace@stjohns-laf.org*

January Book Group

Imbeciles: The Supreme Court, American Eugenics, and the Sterilization of Carrie Buck by Adam Cohen

8:30 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 24

St. John's Book Group will discuss Adam Cohen's *Imbeciles: The Supreme Court, American Eugenics, and the Sterilization of Carrie Buck* (2016).

Eugenics? An historical marker on the State Capitol grounds in Indianapolis bears the title: "1907 Indiana Eugenics Law." The text reads, in part: "In 1907, Governor J. Frank Hanly approved the first state eugenics law making sterilization mandatory for certain individuals in state custody." Cohen's book focuses on eugenics history in the U.S., a troubling history revealing societal willingness to pass laws mandating sterilization of certain individuals, laws ignoring human dignity, social justice, autonomy. Such laws, ultimately passed in 32 states, were driven by the "science" of eugenics, to prevent the feebleminded, the poor, immigrants ... — those seen as a lower class drag on the upper class — from reproducing.

Cohen uses Carrie Buck's sterilization to tell this story. Her sterilization followed a sham trial to test the 1924 Virginia eugenics law. The case was appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court where Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, Jr., wrote the majority opinion declaring the law constitutional. Such "negative" eugenics is now behind us. Modern science, however, offers "positive" eugenics. Should we not know history?

We will begin with a PowerPoint presentation on eugenics history, followed by discussion of Cohen's book. The presentation will provide a basis for participation even if you've not read the book, so don't be dissuaded.

Join us Wednesday, Jan. 24, at 6:30 pm in St. John's Commons. The entire evening will last no longer than 90 minutes. — *Karl Brandt, kb1038@aol.com*

St. John's Parishioners,

Thank you for all of the support, donations and well-wishes this past year. The pantry has been successful in effectively providing supplemental nourishment to food insecure families, but we still have a few needs in order to keep running efficiently.

For donations, neither chicken-noodle soup nor boxed cereal have been readily available for purchase from Food Finders for some time but are two of our most-requested items. The standard size (think Campbell's) cans of soup are preferred for our distribution practices. Any boxed cereal or breakfast bars are appreciated. We have plenty of egg cartons since we do not distribute eggs frequently, so please do not feel obligated to save your cartons from home.

Understandably, many of you are not available to volunteer during our daytime pantry hours, but there are a few other ways you can help out. We accumulate a lot of cardboard boxes throughout the week, all of which need to be broken down and taken to the recycling plant on South River Road in West Lafayette. If anyone is available to help with that, especially on Monday and Wednesday afternoons between 2-3 p.m., it would be most helpful. Fridays or Saturdays would be good days to get some cleared out as well. Please email or call me if you are interested in helping with this.

On Mondays and Wednesdays we could also use a Delivery Supervisor for about two hours, approximately 1-3 p.m. This person would simply guide the volunteers on where to stock the items that arrive and help return banana boxes to Food Finders (you may have seen these piled up in the hallway from time to time).

Also, on the first Monday of each month, a large donation (between 400-800 pounds) needs to be picked up from St. Tom's in West Lafayette. St. Tom's asks that it be picked up before 11:15 a.m., and it can be delivered to the pantry any time after 11:30 a.m. Most weeks I've been able to fit it all in my vehicle; sometimes I have to make two trips. This is really a two or three person job, and a truck would be helpful.

We do get surprise large donations from time to time, which the donors usually want picked. If anyone is willing to be on call for these instances, please let me know. It is not very often, but tough for one person to handle nonetheless.

Again, thank you all for being so welcoming and for all of the prayers during my husband's health crisis this year. I am very grateful to the St. John's Family for all of your support. — *Donna Barker, Director, St. John's/LUM Food Pantry, foodpantry@stjohns-laf.org, (765) 337-4511*

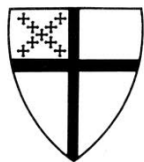
From the Vestry: November meeting summary

- Bradley welcomed Hannah Vinacco as the new youth representative to the Vestry, who will serve until the start of the next academic year. He also noted that Catherine Sandhage will be joining the Vestry to finish Amy Van Epps' term.
- Capital Campaign update: As of Wednesday, Nov. 15, the current amount pledged was \$686,950. The Vestry discussed additional projects that might be added back that were removed. These included cleaning all the stained-glass windows; building cabinets in the back of the church to help with storage and reduce clutter; refurbishing the 12-Step meeting room/pantry space, and also adding an additional hearing loop and integrated sound system to the parish hall. Other ideas included railings to help parishioners down the step after communion and the addition of an automatic east vestibule entry door. There were several other suggestions. Please see the 11/15/17 meeting minutes to read about all of them. Bradley noted that the Vestry would wait until after the first of the year to make decisions based on the final campaign total and how much additional money will be available.
- Bradley also mentioned using some of the additional pledge funds to give a gift of thanksgiving to an as-yet unidentified group or service. Maggie McClure said that if that was done, we would need real consent from the congregation. Rachel Ravellette noted that she and Charlie Shook had already discussed some kind of thanksgiving offering, consistent with best auditing practices and connected to the celebration on 12/2/17.
- The Capital Campaign celebration will be held on Saturday, Dec. 2, 4-6 p.m. This time frame will overlap with the city's Christmas activities, which include the parade. Access across Main Street will be restricted, so folks coming to the celebration from the south side of Lafayette need to plan accordingly. Bradley said that St. John's has reserved the TAF lot and the J&C lot, but we will need to make sure there are signs/people indicating the restricted parking.
- Current 2018 budget info includes 86 pledges so far for approximately \$310,000, which is about \$90,000 short of the projected 2018 budget.
- The Vestry election is scheduled for Dec. 3, 2017. The slate includes Rebekah Sims, Gayle Ennis, Angela Mosier and Elaine Johnson. The Vestry retreat is tentatively scheduled for Feb. 17, 2018. Bradley prefers going off site, but a location has not yet been determined.
- Maggie McClure explained that there will be 99 children from 38 different families for Jubilee Christmas. St. John's will continue soliciting money, toys and volunteers. Jubilee Christmas will be held on Saturday, Dec. 9, 2017.
- Bradley and Hilary have started discussion involving a parish retreat for next year at Waycross, tentatively in October 2018. This event is still in the early planning stages.
- Personnel committee member Randy Brist reported that the committee has already conducted personnel reviews with Teresa, Hilary and Michael. Donna Barker's review will be completed within a few days.
- Bruce Johnson has agreed to draw up emergency plans for the church that will cover all manner of emergencies. Additional discussion dealt with the need for an updated security system with multiple cameras at several different locations.
- Bradley will use a week of his continuing education time to take time off the week of Dec. 3, 2017. He will still be around and in church but will be using his time to read and prepare for future sermons. He also discussed the Prayers of the People and how they are dynamic. Parishioners may have noticed that programs and/or people that we routinely pray for may change from time to time. This is normal and will continue to happen.
