



Quimby Organ Dedication Concert

7:30 p.m. Friday, Feb. 1

The new Quimby organ was officially completed on Dec. 6. The last pieces of molding/trim were installed, the final balancing of sound adjusted and the final pipes tuned. The first of several celebration concerts will begin with the official dedication recital on Friday, Feb. 1. The organist will be Todd Wilson, head of the Organ Department at the Cleveland Institute of Music and Director of Music at Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Cleveland. He is also the curator of the E.M. Skinner organ at Severance Hall, an organ builder on which the Quimby firm models its philosophy of sound.



Organist Todd Wilson

Todd Wilson has been heard in recital at many major venues throughout the United States, Europe and Japan, including Symphony Hall (Birmingham, UK), Westminster Abbey (London), St. Patrick's Cathedral (Dublin), Los Angeles' Walt Disney Concert Hall, Chicago's Orchestra Hall, Cleveland's Severance Hall, Dallas' Meyerson Symphony Center, Philadelphia's Verizon Hall, Nashville's Schermerhorn Symphony Center, Milwaukee's Uihlein Hall, Washington National Cathedral, St. Patrick's Cathedral (New York City), and the 21,000-seat Mormon Conference Center in Salt Lake City. He also was a recitalist for Austrian Radio in Vienna, and in January 2005 he presented his first solo recital in Tokyo. Additionally, he has played with some of the world's finest symphony orchestras.

Dear sisters and brothers,

I am writing this on the heels of Thanksgiving Day, in the middle of Advent, and in preparation for the Christmas season. I am particularly hopeful about our ministry this year, in large part because I have seen so many moments of grace recently, so many ways that

we continue to live into our mission of worshiping, sharing God's love and our lives, and making Christ known.

Let me begin by saying I'm so grateful that the construction and organ installation are all finished.

I am grateful for those who help make our glorious worship possible — our acolytes, Eucharistic ministers, MCs, readers, oblation bearers, ushers and greeters. I am especially grateful for those who have been serving in these ministries for many, many years. I would like to thank all the youth acolytes who joined this fall and add an additional element of beauty and reverence to our worship. I am grateful for the altar guild — for their dedication and persistence. I am grateful for our choir and for all they bring to our worship. I give thanks for those who have been lifting their voices in praise for decades —Marylin,

Kaye, Linda, Cynthia, Bill, Olynn — and those who have joined more recently — Colleen, Cindy, Eric, Ben and Jennifer, just to name a few. I am grateful to the many voices that have filled our pulpit this year beyond the regulars, including Rachel Ravellette, John Gedrick, Jean Beniste, Fatimah Yakuba-Madus, Rabbi Michael Harvey, Rebekah Sims and Kristin White. Thanks to each and every one of you for all you do to honor God and our tradition of beautiful Anglican worship.

Did I mention that I'm grateful that we're done with the construction?

I am grateful for all the ways you share God's love and your lives with our wider community. I am grateful for the prayer shawl ministry, for our Eucharistic visitors and for all the other ways you

reach out by making turkeys for the Community meal, by offering safe space for 12-step groups, by reaching out at the Lafayette Pride Festival, and prepping 13,000 lbs. of meat at Food Finders Food Bank. I am thankful for the return of a full season of Wednesday lunchtime concerts now that the renovation is over, and for all the ways St. John's supports the arts in our community by hosting the Master Chorale, the Tippecanoe Chamber Music Society and others. I am thankful that you are so willing to open this church and your hearts.

I am thankful for Georgia Brist, Katie Elder, Mary Kay McCauley, Maggie McClure and



Angela Mosier, who organize most of our Jubilee Christmas effort. I am also grateful for all the other volunteers who provide a great deal of Christmas joy even in the midst of tough times. I am thankful for those of you who came to host, to wrap presents and to assist in big ways and small. I am thankful for those of you who support this ministry by donating (including Cynthia Stauffacher and her lab at Purdue who donated a huge stash of toys). This year, we hosted 42 families with 135 children. It was chaotic and wonderful all at the same time (kind of like Christmas morning). I swear that one of the organizers suggested we could host a few more families next year. I am grateful for that generous spirit even as I tried to imagine how we might cram even four more people into St. John's Commons.

We have done some hard work this year discerning what God is calling us to do and how we might continue our rich history of sharing God's love with our community. I am grateful for Maggie McClure, Rachel Ravellette and Rebekah Sims for their insight and courage as they surveyed the congregation and the needs of the community and helped chart a path forward. I am also thankful for everyone who shared their history, experience, hopes and dreams

during that discernment. And while we have decided to close the St. John's/LUM Food Pantry in the coming year, I remain profoundly grateful for the work this congregation has done through that ministry. For nearly 30 years, St. John's and Lafayette Urban Ministry have partnered to help feed those suffering from food insecurity in Greater Lafayette. The origins of the Food Pantry and St. John's commitment to caring for those in need go back even

further, as far back as a food stash in the Rector's office at least 40 years ago. I am grateful to all those who have worked in the pantry — sharing groceries, a smile and maybe even a silent prayer ("these are the gifts of God for the people of God") during those decades. I am grateful to those who served as pantry directors during that time, including Rachel Shook (who directed the pantry while she was pregnant with her daughter, Lydia, who is now a sophomore in college) and our current director, Katy Travis. I am grateful for Jane Vanable and Deb Lindenlaub, who recruited volunteers and made schedules, and for Hilary Goonewardene, who has picked up baked goods from Payless for years. I am grateful to Lafayette Urban Ministry, who has been a wonderful partner over the years and does so much for the Greater Lafayette community. I

> look forward to the opportunity to celebrate the pantry's ministry and all those who gave so much to feed and care for so many.

> Oh, and what about that organ? I sure am glad that's finally installed and working.

I am grateful for those who entered the church this year through the waters of baptism: Wesley Johnson, Glenn Schoenhals, Emma Schoenhals, Lillian Umulis, Ava Eichhorn and

I am thankful for the many opportunities for Christian formation here: the Tuesday Bible Study, the EfM book group, the Big Questions classes and the monthly book group to name a few. I am thankful for Hilary Cooke, Ben McCartney, Cathleen McCartney, Rebekah Sims and Tim Smith, who work with the youth group. I am always grateful to the youth for their energy, curiosity and faith.

And the construction I don't want to forget that. Glad that's done.

I give thanks to God for St. John's leadership. I am thankful for the St. John's Vestry and for Ashley Bigelow, Mary Kay McCauley and Katie Nielsen who were recently elected to serve. I am thankful for Kathy Johnson, Carl Taylor and Angela Mosier, who have served as wardens this year, and for Stephanie Amador Tribbett, who is finishing her second year as chair of the Finance Committee. I am thankful for all those who work behind the scenes: the *Eagle* editor Cindy Gerlach, the office help, our treasurers Jim Hess and Bill McInerney, the property

committee, the counters and all the financial secretaries, the finance committee, the stewardship committee and the investment committee. I am thankful for Eva Duran, who makes sure the church is clean and inviting, and for our

friends from Main Street Management who chase leaks and make sure the building is still standing.

I am incredibly grateful for the leadership of our Bishop, Jennifer Baskerville-Burrows. I am grateful for the amazing ministries of this Diocese and for a renewed sense of our shared mission and ministry. I give thanks to God for you and for our ministry together. I am so blessed to be here in ministry with you. Like St. Paul, I will not cease giving thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers.

January 2019 Book Group: Varina by Charles Frazier

7 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 24

On Jan. 24 we will begin our Winter/Spring reading series. There is an annotated list available in the Commons (on the bulletin board and in the information rack). Please take one! We are not a book "club" — no invitations are necessary. Just come if you are interested in what we are reading. We usually meet for one hour.

Our first selection is *Varina*, published in 2018 by Charles Frazier. Frazier is best known for his 1997 novel, *Cold Mountain. Varina* is also about the Civil War era, focused on the life of Varina Howell Davis (1826-1906), the wife of Jefferson Davis, the only president of the Confederate States.

The book is fiction, but Frazier has obviously done a thorough job in reading Varina's voluminous correspondence, so her portrayal in the book is very believable. A large portion of the book describes her flight from Richmond in 1865 as the war was ending, along with her children, a former slave, Ellen, who cared for the children, and a couple of protectors. The descriptions of the devastation wrought by Sherman's March to the Sea are powerful and moving. But — we each find something different in a book, so come to share what you found interesting.


