From the Rector: An Update on St. John's Sharing Ministries

Along with the changes we are making to our Outreach ministries, we are also rebranding those ministries. St. John's is a worshipping community that shares God's love and our lives by welcoming others and reaching out to our community and makes Christ known through intentional formation and service to the world. Whatever the traditional term "outreach" conjures in your mind, it may not entirely capture what we mean by "sharing" in the sense of our larger mission. It is true that we share God's love by giving out food in the food pantry (or by providing the resources so that others can). But we also share God's love by welcoming people into the church for a musical concert. It is true that we share our lives by attending an interfaith gathering and meeting people from other faiths. But we are also sharing our lives when we advocate for those suffering homelessness or navigating the immigration system. We share God's love and our lives when we work with Habitat for Humanity — putting in sweat equity with prospective homeowners. But we are also sharing God's love and our lives when we take the initiative to welcome LGBTQ folks to St. John's or when we leave our building and advocate for their full inclusion in the life of the Church or for their full equality in society. We share God's love and our lives by caring and serving, by welcoming and reaching out. If you hear me talk about our Sharing Ministries rather than Outreach" that's why. I think it better captures what we're actually trying to do. Of course, the name means only as much as the resources, time and energy we put into actually sharing God's love and our lives.

In late January, I convened a meeting of folks who were interested in supporting our Sharing Ministries with their resources, time and energy. There was a great response — more than two dozen folks showed up and many others who were unable to attend expressed their interest. We are now putting together an Advocacy Committee to organize and communicate about our Sharing Ministries. More information will be forthcoming.

In the meantime, I do want to share one exciting idea that is on the table. Katy Bunder, Executive Director of Food Finders, has asked St. John's to partner with them in creating a Speaker's Bureau. The Speaker's Bureau is a leadership program that focuses on helping clients of the Food Finders Pantry develop communication and leadership skills, improve resiliency and advocate for themselves and others experiencing poverty. A group of committed facilitators will lead clients in telling their own stories of experiencing poverty, especially food insecurity. Course sessions will cover public speaking, advocacy and media use. These sessions will be paired with others that address self-care to help participants develop resiliency. Participants and facilitators will focus on creating intentional community within the group that will hopefully continue beyond the 10-week course.

As an organization, Food Finders will benefit from the participants' advocacy and representation, and the community will benefit from improved food security through their testimony. This opportunity will benefit the Food Finders Food Pantry clients by providing them with skills and community connections. In addition, clients who successfully complete this program will "graduate" and become available to speak publicly about their experience. They will be equipped to advocate on behalf of themselves, Food Finders Food Bank and other support agencies at both the local and

state levels. Graduates can be "booked" for speaking engagements and paid for their participation on behalf of through stipends. It is our hope that the graduates would also become leaders within the community — advocating not only for the organizations themselves, but, more importantly, for those who are served by the various organizations and agencies.

I believe the Speaker's Bureau fits perfectly within St. John's mission as a worshiping community that seeks to share God's love and our lives by reaching out into the community. While this program will not have an explicitly spiritual or Christian focus, our desire is always to make Christ known through our generous and gracious service to those experiencing need. I am excited about the possibility of helping empower new leaders in our community. There will be many opportunities for people at St. John's to participate in and support the Speaker's Bureau. As the plans for this program crystallize, I will be in touch with you about how you can be involved.

The Rite of Reconciliation

The Book of Common Prayer reminds us that "The ministry of reconciliation, which has been committed by Christ to his Church, is exercised through the care each Christian has for others, through the common prayer of Christians assembled for public worship and through the priesthood of Christ and his ministers declaring absolution." The Rite of the Reconciliation of a Penitent (known as confession in some traditions) is available for all who desire it and is not restricted to any particular time or season. However, because the season of Lent — which begins on Ash Wednesday, March 6 — is a time specifically dedicated as a time of self-reflection and penitence, it is an especially appropriate time to seek reconciliation with God, one another and with ourselves. While the Anglican approach to the rite of reconciliation has always been "all may, some should, none must," it can be a powerful reminder that, despite our failings, we are forgiven and loved by God. March 2019 Book Group: *Monique and the Mango Rain* by Kris Holloway **7** p.m., Thursday, March **28**, The Commons

Can you conceive of living on a daily per capita income of 50 cents (USD), having no reliable source of safe drinking water, with minimal access to health care and struggling with food insufficiency? Life in much of sub-Saharan Africa poses challenges like these. It is into such worlds that young American Peace Corps Volunteers venture. What are their lives like?

Such an opportunity was welcomed by Kris Holloway, a 22-year old native of small-town Ohio, when she graduated from Allegheny College in small-town Pennsylvania. Her invitation read: "Your two-year assignment is in the country of Mali, West Africa. Departure Date: July 29, 1989." Kris tells of her experiences assisting Monique, the 24-year old Malian midwife in Nampossela, a small town in southern Mali, where her challenge is to help improve women's health and pre- and post-natal care. She arrives knowing French (which, fortunately, Monique also speaks) but little Bambara (the lingua franca). She arrives having never observed a live birth (but then, how many 22-year-old Americans have?). Over her two years, she and Monique forge a deep respect and love for each other as they work to better the lives of Malian women.

A heartwarming story of human strength and resilience, of dedication, of coming to grips with Malian culture, and of growth, *Monique and the Mango Rains* is, above all, a story of what people of diverse cultures can accomplish when they work together toward a common goal.

Rector's Forum: Theology at the End of Life **Sundays in March**

Our Rector, Bradley Pace, is planning to take a sabbatical in the summer of 2020. In preparation for that, he is applying for a Clergy Renewal Grant from the Center for Congregations. 

Lenten Study 2019

5:30-7 p.m. Thursdays, March 14, 21, 28 and April 6

For our Lenten study this year we will be holding intergenerational Godly Play on four Thursday nights. I have heard people say that Godly Play is just for small children, but this is not at all the case. Godly Play is for people of all ages who wish to enter into the stories of our faith from a place of curiosity and wondering.

We will gather on four consecutive **Thursday evenings from 5:30-7 p.m.** (March 14, 21, 28, and April 4). We will begin with a shared supper — there will be sign-up sheets to contribute soup, bread or fruit for each week.

Following our light supper, we will move into hearing the Godly Play story. As we do on Sunday mornings in the Godly Play room, we will have "response time" following the story. In the classrooms we respond in a variety of ways: arts and crafts, reading books or working with any of the stories in the Godly Play room. We will be sure to have some arts and crafts supplies available, but I invite you to bring anything you think would be a helpful response tool for you (think: knitting or crocheting, a particular book you are reading for Lent, adult coloring books, etc.). In addition, we will have supplies available for any people/families who would like to make their own Godly Play story of the Creation or the Parable of the Good Shepherd to keep at home. If you think you would like to make your own story, please let me know so I can be sure to have enough materials for those who are interested.

We will end with a brief service of compline and send folks on their way by 7 p.m.



10 Rules for Respect

Every now and then, it's good to revisit some important ground rules for our common life as a church. The following are "10 Rules for Respect" that I have published in *the* Eagle a few times. I am offering them again, not because anything specifically prompted me to do so (we discussed them at the recent Vestry orientation, so they were fresh on my mind). But over the years, I have found them very helpful. These "Rules for Respect" find their expression in



various places in Scripture such as Paul's first letter to the Corinthians (6:1-11) or Matthew's Gospel (18:15-20). This particular list comes from another pastor named Charles Christian. These rules — or rather, the rule of life they embody — can help us maintain healthy relationships as the body of Christ.

I will try to follow these rules in my interaction and communication with each of you. I ask that you also follow them with each other and with me.

- 1. If you have a problem with me, come to me (privately).
- 2. If I have a problem with you, I will come to you (privately).
- 3. If someone has a problem with me and comes to you, send them to me. I promise to do the same for you.
- 4. If someone consistently will not come to me, say, "Let's go to Bradley together. I am sure he will see us about this." Again, I promise to do the same for you.
- 5. Be careful how you interpret me. On matters that are unclear, do not feel pressured to interpret my feelings or thoughts. It is easy for us to misrepresent one another. Please, give me the benefit of the doubt and/or ask me about it.
- 6. I will be careful how I interpret you, give you the benefit of the doubt, and/or ask you about it.
- 7. If it's confidential, don't tell. If you or anyone comes to me in confidence, I won't tell unless a) the person is going to harm himself/herself, b) the person is going to physically harm someone else, c) a child has been physically or sexually abused. I will expect the same from you.
- 8. I will not read or respond to unsigned letters or notes.
- 9. I do not manipulate. I will not be manipulated. Do not let others manipulate you. Do not let others manipulate me through you.
- 10. When in doubt, just say it. The only dumb questions are those that don't get asked. If you have a concern, pray about it, and then (if led) speak up. If I can answer your question without misrepresenting something, someone, or breaking confidence, I will.

As always, please don't hesitate to come to me with any concerns. I cannot promise that I will always agree with you or give your concern the attention you desire. But I will always listen to your concerns, and I will greatly appreciate your honesty. I will always try to do the same for you. – Bradley Pace, bradleypace@stjohnslaf.org
