From the Rector

As you no doubt know, the St. John's/LUM Food Pantry closed March 30. The week before, we held a celebration of the Food Pantry's ministry. Clients/guests, partner organizations and supporters, as well as many volunteers, attended. It was a wonderful evening even though it was bittersweet. Nearly everyone there was happy to celebrate nearly 40 years of the food pantry's ministry (nearly 30 of that partnering with LUM) and understood our congregation's need to change our Sharing ministries. At the same time, most of us were sad to see this amazing ministry — with its rich history of caring for people in Greater Lafayette — come to an end.

In my own reflections on the pantry's ministry, I came back to the beautiful icon that has been hanging in the pantry for the past several years. The icon depicts the feeding of the 5,000 in John's Gospel. John tells us that Jesus took a few fish and a few loaves of bread and fed a great multitude. Here is a miracle if ever there was one. How does Jesus magically transform a simple dinner for a few people into enough food to feed a multitude? In the story, the miracle is clearly intended to show Jesus' power.

But the story of "The Feeding of the 5,000" and the history of the St. John's/LUM Food Pantry both illustrates the power we have — a power that comes from the transforming love of God — to feed people. In the Gospel story, Jesus' disciple Andrew comes to Jesus and says, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish." Of course, this isn't enough to feed 5,000 people. So Jesus tells everyone to sit down. It isn't recorded, but I imagine Jesus saying, "We need to feed these people. This young man has brought five loaves and two fish. What else have we got?"

Slowly people start to call out:

- We have a ton of mac-n-cheese.
- I've got cans of corn, green beans, peaches, mandarin oranges.
- We brought a lot of meat some ground beef, a little chicken, maybe some alligator.
- We've got bags of lentils. In fact, we've got lentils for days.
- Anybody got peanut butter?

One guy drops off some vegetables from the market around the corner. Hilary says she'll go to Payless and pick up all the extra cakes and donuts. Jane and Joe start a phone tree to make sure all of this food gets distributed. Deb starts a mailing list and puts together a calendar. The disciples start a call-out for volunteers. Jim's got an old truck to haul stuff around. After a while, thousands of people are being fed. After a while, what started out as 5,000 hungry people and a kid with five loaves and two fish becomes a food pantry. After a while — after several decades, in fact — what started out a something small has served millions of pounds of food and tens of thousands of people.

Now this may not seem miraculous to you — we do this kind of thing all the time. But there is something miraculous about everyone deciding to turn over what they have to the greater good. One way of reading this story is to see Jesus — and the little boy that started it all off with his loaves and fishes — as inspiring the crowd to contribute what they have to a greater cause, to a larger purpose. In the end, each person's generosity was multiplied thousands of times over. When this kid brought along five loaves and the two fish, he wasn't expecting to feed 5,000 people. But as the people became inspired to share, his offering was multiplied beyond his wildest imagination. So much so, that there were 12 baskets of bread left over, and probably more than a few boxes of mac-n-cheese, ground beef, some chips and a lot of love.

Thank you to everyone who supported St. John's Food Pantry ministry over the years. Thank you for your donations of money and food, for your hard work and time, and for your dedication. It was a great

run for a great ministry. But don't take my word for it. Have a look at some of the comments below. See what a difference our ministry makes. May it inspire us and encourage us to even greater acts of service in the future. — Bradley Pace, bradleypace@stjohns-laf.org

"The last time I worked in the pantry, I told a client we were closing and invited him to our celebration. He told me that he had moved to the area from Vermont many years ago and that a person could get by in Lafayette even if they were struggling. He was incredibly appreciative for our service to the community."

"After a few years, I was asked to work as a 'shopper,' which meant driving to the old Food Bank warehouse on the south side of town to select items from what was available there. I was trained by a volunteer from St. Boniface. She was great! She told me to be sure to first check out what was free — especially eggs and bread — then she tipped me off about which brands of canned/packaged goods or which frozen meats would give our clients the best nutritive bang for the buck. She had a large family of her own and was a very thrifty shopper!"

"I always enjoyed the Volunteer Appreciation Brunches in the spring. Although a lot of extra work, the volunteers seemed to enjoy seeing each other and being thanked. At our last one, the theme was marshmallow rabbits called PEEPs because we literally had thousands of them. I still have the slide show for that titled, after the words of

"Thank you for helping me make it through college by feeding my family."



"I have enjoyed volunteering here for many years and all the different people I got to meet, including Purdue students."




1897 Easter Bulletin

St. John's Shares: Family Promise Week of May 13-19

Family Promise of Greater Lafayette (FPGL) is a short-term emergency shelter dedicated to keeping families together as one unit while providing them with necessary resources to gain self-sufficiency and permanent housing. They became the only local family emergency shelter in July 2017 when the Salvation Army's family shelter closed. In their new establishment on Elmwood Avenue, they can host five families at one time. However, they rely on volunteers from local church hosts throughout the year.

In order to help, St. John's is looking to help Family Promise several times a year. Our first week will be **May 13-19**. We will provide meals for the families at the shelter on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of that week as well as provide at least two adult volunteers to spend time with the residents on Monday, Wednesday and Friday evenings and during the day on Sunday. This is a great way to serve wither as a family or as an individual by providing a meal or hanging out and getting to know the residents. Look for more information in the coming weeks.

St. John's Shares: Indy Pride Saturday, June 8

The Indy Pride Festival is set for Saturday, June 8. This year, for the first time, the Diocese of Northern Indiana will join the Diocese of Indianapolis in the parade and help us at the booth. Come join in this new collaboration among Episcopalians from across the state.

And we need the fabulous Episcopalians in our diocese to make this happen."

As I prepare for another upcoming sabbatical this June, July, and August, I am preparing to do some of these things again, but with a little bit lighter schedule. Plans involve attending the Association of Anglican Musician Conference in Boston, singing masses and evensongs in Paris at Notre Dame and the American Cathedral there, as well as a week's worth of services at Ely Cathedral in the United Kingdom.

I would like to perform another full organ concert at St. John's in the next year, so practicing the organ will be necessary. As I wrote upon my return to work in 2012, I rested a lot during that summer. I didn't know how tired I was until I had the sabbatical. Now, seven years later (older!) with more responsibility and expectations (i.e. higher levels of stress), I am certain that I will be catching up on my rest.

I will be away from St. John's from June 1 to Aug.23. I will miss the quiet movement around the parish that our church is accustomed to during the summer months, the 9 a.m. eucharists where our two congregations become one, the church picnic and the other fun things unique to our summer routine. Ben McCartney will be playing for most of the services in my absence. His return to our choir has been a blessing already, and his contributions in leading service music in my absence will be as well. A Note About Email

Scammers are constantly looking for new ways to trick those of us who use email or social media. Scammers can now make it look like you are receiving an email from someone you trust, but it's all completely fake. Bill McInerney, St. John's Treasurer, received an email from me asking me to send him info about depositing church funds. Because it was during the capital campaign, he thought it might be legit. But then he remembered that Teresa (our diligent Parish administrator), would never have trusted me with that kind of information! Fortunately, he reached out to me and confirmed that it wasn't me. This stuff is easy to fake now, so do be wary. If you're ever unsure about an email coming from someone at St. John's, please call the church office and confirm.

Also, please know that while I love using electronic communication (email, Facebook and the like, etc.), I am often inundated with email. If it's a particularly busy time at church, I may get so far behind that your important message could go unanswered for several days. If you email me and need a response right away, please put "URGENT" or something similar in the subject line. You might also contact me directly by calling the office at 765-742-4079 or my cell phone at 312-208-8791.
